

# Yuma County Bird Checklist

Latest update: 9 Feb 2024, 400 Species

## Seasons

**Sp:** Spring is Mar-May

**Su:** Summer is Jun-Aug

**F:** Fall is Sep-Nov

**W:** Winter is Dec-Feb

## Status Codes & Notes

**C** Common – present and widespread; usually seen 3 out of 4 visits

**F** Fairly common – often present; usually seen 2 out of 4 visits

**U** Uncommon – occurs regularly, but may be absent or in low numbers, and usually seen only 1 out of 4 visits

**R** Rare – occurs infrequently, or in a very limited range, and may be absent some years

**I** Irregular – not expected annually; often found in varying abundance

**CA** Casual – out of its usual range and not expected in our area on a regular basis; at least 5 records for the area

**A** Accidental – not expected; fewer than 5 records. If there is only a single record for the species, I've annotated the checklist with additional information.

**B** Breeds – currently breeds in Yuma County

**HB** Historical breeder – bred twenty+ years ago

**PB** Probable breeder – a likely breeder, but not confirmed

“Status Codes” are a somewhat subjective way of indicating how common or uncommon a particular species of bird is in our area. They will give you an idea of how easy it is to find your target within the proper habitat, during a particular season. However, some birds classified as Rare (R), based on very limited range, may be quite easy to find and identify (such as Black Rail). In cases like this, I've annotated the checklist with comments. These status codes are also dependent on searching for your targets in the proper habitat. For example, Rock Pigeons are often abundant in cities, but absent from the desert. Similarly, Black-tailed Gnatcatchers are common in many desert washes, but absent from most towns. Typical habitat preference for most birds is described in popular field guides.

Within a particular season, there is also much variation among the status of birds. For example, many shorebirds start their southward migration in late summer. For example, a bird marked as Common (C) during summer (such as Greater Yellowlegs) may be totally absent in June and common only in July and August.

Breeding codes are based on surveys done by the Arizona Breeding Bird Atlas team between 1993 and 2004, from reports in *American Birds*, *National Audubon Society Field Notes*, and *North American Birds*, and from personal observations.

This checklist is in American Ornithological Society (formerly AOU) taxonomical order (64<sup>th</sup> supplement, 11 July 2023).
